Editors Choice Tippets

Trout rescued from low rivers

Fish are being stranded and South Canterbury farmers' and households' water use restricted as the region dries out. Trout have been salvaged from the Waihao and Pareora rivers due to the dry conditions, says Fish & Game officer Mark Webb. Although some reaches of many Canterbury rivers naturally dried out in summer, a regular watch was being kept on the Tengawai, Waihi, and Orari rivers and springs in the Geraldine area. Fish & Game supports maintaining river flows where there were competing demands for water. The Opuha Water Ltd irrigation scheme's longest period of irrigation limits continues, although the restrictions have been reduced. Chief executive Tony McCormick said



the 50 per cent water take restrictions imposed on December 16 had been dropped back down to 25 per cent.

"This is done through the Opuha Environmental Flow Release Advisory Group (OEFRAG). Farmers were on the 50 per cent restrictions for two weeks and they felt the brunt of it. "A lot of cropping guys drop off towards new year's and there is a natural drop in irrigation demand in late February so the restriction regime has been reverted back to 25 per cent." McCormick said the restriction would return to 50 per cent if the lake level fell to 25 per cent of its capacity. That could occur in about three weeks if current weather patterns continued. Irrigation restrictions would be tightened to 75 per cent if the dry weather continued and the lake levels dropped to 10 per cent.

Interesting fishing over the past month or so with very low water in many streams and the rivers also getting low but that is my preference as the lower they get the fish get closer! However I believe the stream fish have suffered and you can see that by the evidence in their condition which in general terms has been below average. Since then we have had rain and snow in the mountains which made fishing virtually impossible but it is clearing up well now.

We can again look forward to good hatches towards Autumn and as the temperature has been stable around a high of 20 deg the willow grubs are still actively falling in the water which is what we want.



Top fishing has been had in the afternoons and evenings on the river with fish taking wee CDC floating nymphs early in the hatch and then selectively taking emergers then duns and or spinners or any one at any time! Challenging for sure.

Willow grubbing has been difficult to say the least. Not in catching them particularly but in finding grubbers feeding. Tempreature seems to play its part as well as wind conditions and the general demeanour of the fish which can be frustratingly difficult to interpret.

Do you ever feel like you've got a sixth sense working for you when you're out fly fishing?
