


### Is It Safe To Go In The Water?

You can find some information on the conditions of our rivers on the internet at [www.lawa.org.nz](http://www.lawa.org.nz). For Southland this covers the 4 main rivers as well as the Waikaia, with a total of 7 sites. As you can see below this makes pretty grim reading. The amber colour means caution is advised and the red means it is not safe for swimming. Green means it is all good but none of the test river sites in Southland are up to this standard.

Further to this I have been sent a photo of the outflow from the Gore sewerage treatment plant into the Mataura River. Note that this is downstream from the site where the lawa data comes from so has no influence on the



lawa results. I received this photo the night I returned from the Club night on the river at Coal Pit Road (which is downstream from Gore) and I had been wet wading in the river. I had my waders with me but as I had spent the afternoon on a delightful small stream I was already in my wet gear when I arrived at Coal Pit Road so stayed that way. I am not sure that was a good idea but I don't seem to have suffered any ill effects.



## Fishing Reports by Redtag

### December 2018

Tough going this month and no sign of improvement with yet more rain forecast. I had a limited opportunity between storms to fish a wee stream that was fishable unlike many others in the catchment. Arrived early morning to find the fish up and taking duns off the top during a steady hatch of mayfly. Some fish were also smashing damselflies and jumping right out of the water to grab them in mid-air. Fish taking size 16 barbless CDC emerging duns and size 12 barbless red CDC damselflies. Then the dastardly easterly kicked in around lunchtime and put them down. One of the only times this month I have been able to fish but well worth the effort to get out there and battle it out.



### January 2019

Some stable conditions at last has brought the odd spell of fishable water back on the agenda. The main rivers and most streams are still fluctuating between high and slightly discoloured to medium level and semi clear. The lower temperatures over the last week or so has seen a reduction in willow grubs with very little action locally. This should change when we get the long hot dry summer the forecasters have been promising us! Willow grubs seem to like the hotter weather to hatch out so hopefully we get some again soon. On the other hand there has been significant hatches of mayfly around most of the day and in the evening. This is the first activity I have seen for many many weeks. The trout are still not fully keyed in to the hatch but as time goes by they will become more co-operative. Best flies are CDC duns and CDC emerging nymphs in natural colours. Observe the rise forms carefully and selected a fly to suit where the fish are taking the naturals just under, in or on top of the surface film. Tight Lines

Four of us turned up for the January Club Trip on a cool morning with a very threatening weather forecast. We decided to head up to the Mataura at Balfour. The river was up a bit and had some colour but was still fishable. Julie and Paul headed down while I headed up with Daniel.

Unfortunately the weather forecast was right and we had a lot of rain although it did eventually ease.

There was the odd fish about with one or two rises and others under the willows but they didn't look to be taking willow grubs. Daniel managed to land a nice fish on a nymph and I had a couple of hook ups on nymphs both of which came off and missed a couple more on a parachute adams dry. The fish that were taking on the surface were reasonably easy to see as they stood out well from the blue of the water.

Meanwhile Julie and Paul had no luck and headed away at lunch time feeling it was too wet to continue.

## Presidents Report by Dave

Well it has been tough fishing for the last couple of months. Unfortunately the weather has been uncooperative with a lot of wind and rain. The fine days always seemed to coincide with the rivers being up and discoloured. However I have been out quite a few times and caught a few fish.

After reading from Johnny and David Murray-Orr about the good fishing on the small streams I decided I should have a look at one. I am not a fan of the heavily modified rivers that were straightened in the '60's and '70's so found a small stream that was still in pretty much its original condition except for introduced weeds and trees. The first place I looked at there was just too much vegetation so I went to another place where it is much more open. I had a great afternoon on a fine sunny day with clear water and enough fish to keep me happy. Some were even keen enough to come to my net.

Other days I have been out looking for fish feeding on willow grubs. I have caught some but haven't found many to cast to. Of course I haven't found that magic fly that works all the time on these. I tried another new pattern on one on the Mataura and it was quickly taken. The next two fish wouldn't even look at it. One took a different pattern as soon as I put it in front of it. This was the 5<sup>th</sup> different pattern I had tried and it didn't look at any of the others.

Early in December I went out to Menzies College in Wyndham to help out with their Fly Fishing Course. Unfortunately river conditions were poor to say the least but there were a lot of keen boys.

We have our Fly Fishing Course coming up on January 26<sup>th</sup> & 27<sup>th</sup> and will need helpers for the casting on the Saturday afternoon (3pm at James Hargest) and on Sunday at the river (Wyndham Bridge at 9:00am). If you are able to help give Chris a ring on 027 423 7015.

## Menzies College Fly Fishing by Tim Landreth

Fly Fishing has really taken off at Menzies College in Wyndham lately. The staff room is always abuzz before school with talk of fishing, now with 8 staff being keen fisherman, and 6 of these recently hooked on the addictive sport of Fly Fishing. Surrounded by the Mimihau, Mataura and the Wyndham rivers which are all within walking distance of the school, the students have excellent access to some great Fly Fishing opportunities. In mid-2017, Menzies appointed Kit Hustler as Head of Science. He came to us from Northcoate College in Auckland. A native of Zimbabwe, Kit holds a Doctorate in Animal Studies. Since starting at Menzies, he has been able to share his knowledge and love of fish, in particular with his trapping and tagging of Trout in the Mimuhau, and also the exciting discovery of a very healthy population of native Galaxids or giant Kokopu found in the nearby Wyndham reserve which the students regularly trap and monitor, sharing all their data with Fish & Game.

The excitement in class, and around the school was immense, which culminated in our senior biology class entering a short film in the Southland Environmental Awards late last year, in which they won \$1000 for their Trout tagging and monitoring program.



Fast forward to the end of Term 4, 2018. With an excited bunch of around 20 juniors, it was decided that we run a 3 day Fly Fishing course with the help of local experts. Sport Southland were a magnificent help to us, along with Kiwisport who granted us \$2200 to enable us to purchase 10 fly rods to get us going. With the help of Brendon at Hunting & Fishing Invercargill, we had everything we needed, including a few top class tutors to show us the ropes. We were very fortunate to also have Chris Dore from Queenstown come down for a whole day to work with the team which was a fantastic head start for the guys before the Fly Fishing program started.

Dave Harris, along with Brendon from Hunting & Fishing Invercargill kindly gave up their time to teach the group. They gave very informative talks on what flies to use, where to find fish, different types of gear and the like. Then it was in to the main event - casting on the field.

Day two and three were entirely practical. As you'll remember, the conditions back in December were pretty terrible. The Mataura was in flood, and luckily for us, the Mimihau was fishable (sort of!). One trout was caught on a dry dropper rig, which wasn't too bad considering the conditions.

We have a very exciting first term planned. We know for sure many of the boys on the course will be signing up and coming out on our Wednesday afternoon fishing trips, along with other senior students who have indicated a real interest.

I look forward to updating you all with the latest catches and goings-on within the Menzies College Fly Fishing Team.

Of course fishing in the poor light also meant a few takes were missed.
